Scenario: We have £50K available to spend to improve attainment. How can we find out about Young People's priorities for action in the Attainment Challenge?

Purpose: Reaching as many young people to hear their views on the priorities for how this money should be used and then the actual projects that will be funded



Outcome: There is a shared ownership of the priorities - they have not been imposed
